

New Directive and Steering Committees

As you might know, the organizational structure of the APMP consists of a Directive Committee of 12 people that are elected by the members. Within this group, the Steering Committee is elected, which is responsible for the day-to-day running of the association and which includes the President and Secretary. As a result of our biennial elections, held

in March-April, for the renewal of the Directive Committee, its current members are: Bart Van Kerkhove (Belgium), Brendan Larvor (UK), Carmen Martinez Adane (Mexico), Dirk Schlimm (Canada), Gisèle Secco (Brazil), Jemma Lorenat (USA), Jessica Carter (Denmark), José Ferreirós (Spain), Marco Panza (USA/France), Paolo Mancosu (USA), Silvia De Toffoli (USA), and Valeria Giardino (France).

Since the 4-year terms for Secretary and President were over, these positions had also to be filled. On May 22, the Directive Committee met remotely via Zoom and elected Jessica Carter, Valeria Giardino, Silvia De Toffoli, José Ferreirós, and Paolo Mancosu to the new Steering Committee, with Valeria Giardino as the new Secretary and Jessica Carter as the new President.

APMP Meeting report

Our 5th international meeting was held 18–21 January 2020 at the ETH Zürich, Switzerland and was attended by 112 registered participants. We thank Roy Wagner, as the local organizer, and José Ferreirós, as the chair of the scientific committee, as well as the many participants for making the meeting a great success!

We are happy that many young scholars chose to attend the meeting and were impressed with the high quality of the contributed papers. In addition, we note the
